- 2. How can we be confident most children were named in these English wills?
- 3. In a Malthusian economy how many living children will a man have on average when he dies? How many did richer testators have around 1600 in England? How many did the poorest testators have?
- 4. How can we be confident that this is just not a result of poor men leaving children out of their wills (3 reasons)?
- 5. The wills do not reveal the age of the testator. How can we be confident that the reproductive success of the rich is not just a result of people who live longer getting richer?
- 6. What do these patterns of surviving children imply about social mobility in pre-industrial England? Is there empirical evidence that these implications actually held?
- 7. How far back do these patterns seem to extend?
- 8. Did "survival of the richest" also apply to the English Aristocracy? If not, why?
- 9. What seems to have determined reproductive success in Yanomame culture?
- 10. What are two sources of evidence that the reproductive success of the rich extended also to their children?
